MODULE 1

The Calm Before the Storm

Summary of Key Points:

This chapter reminds us that the most dangerous storms often form in seasons of comfort, not in seasons of battle.

Reflection Questions:

- What are some areas in your life where you've become comfortable or spiritually passive?
- If you were in David's position, with power, success, and security, what safeguards would you put in place to stay close to God?
- Are there habits, relationships, or responsibilities that are slowly pulling your attention away from your spiritual life?

MODULE 2

MODULE 3

MODULE 4

Behind the scenes, the kingdom of darkness rejoices, thinking David has sealed his downfall. But even here, God's mercy will later break through, though not without painful consequences.

Reflection Questions:

MODULE 5
